



## Successful remote learning with Educake

Here's a quick guide to getting started with Educake during school closures.

### 1. Get your students on the system

Students will need an account to access the questions. You just need to send us a file with their details. [There's an example template here](#). Send to [support@educake.co.uk](mailto:support@educake.co.uk) and we'll get them uploaded in a couple of hours.

Once they are on, give your students their log in details and you are ready to go!

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### 2. Set your students questions

Many schools are using Educake questions for retrieval practice and for monitoring the home learning they've completed that week. Educake allows students to apply and check what they have been learning and get immediate feedback about how they've done and what they need to go back to again.

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### 3. Track engagement and understanding

It's easy to see which students are engaging with the learning. Teachers can identify areas of weakness on Educake, and use this to give specific feedback to students through the platform. **Q:** What would your top tip be for a teacher new to Educake?

**A:** Just use it. Click on every button and see what it does. There is a lot of data you can get from the leaderboards. Also, set a few small tests first (10 questions) to see exactly what it looks like and how the pupils will respond before you start setting larger quizzes.
